## Science and Explorations with Mr. Moeller

At Springdale Middle School sixteen children make up the Explorations class with Mr. Moeller. The purposes of this class are making math more meaningful and improving math skills.

Science in Mr. Moeller's class is not just about sitting around and doing work from our textbooks because sometimes we do experiments like testing water quality.

Last summer, five Mary Walker teachers-Mr. Moeller, Mrs. Moss, Mr. Gilmore, Mr. Kiefer, and Mr. Kohlstedt-went to Ellensburg, Washington. They learned about water quality testing and integrating math and science.


They also used Springdale's Lucky Duck Pond as a lab to test temperature, flow rate, pH , and conductivity in order to see what could and is living there.

Mr. Moeller is teaching the students of his class how science and math is used in the real world.

## Computers 4 Kids Brings Technology to Classrooms

Since 1998, the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instructions has been working in partnership with other government agencies on a project to refurbish usable surplus state computers and donate them to schools throughout Washington. This project, called Computers 4 Kids, has placed almost 30,000 computers in hundreds of needy schools throughout the state since its inception.

All equipment distributed through the program must meet strict state standards. These standards are based upon a "rule of thumb" of providing computers to schools that are 3 years old or newer.

The Mary Walker School District is able to receive between 24 and 36 computers per year through Computers 4 Kids, allowing us to update existing classroom computers on a rotating basis. Without this program, districts like Mary Walker would quickly fall behind in their ability to keep up with advancing technology.

New state and federal regulations require students to demonstrate certain levels of computer literacy by 8th grade. Having quality computers, such as those received from Computers 4 Kids, provides students with the opportunity to inte-
grate technology into their learning, and gives them the skills they will need both in school and beyond.

Staff, students, and administrators at Mary Walker are grateful for the computers provided by the Computer 4 Kids program. Technology is definitely a huge part of everyday life and having the equipment we need helps us take giant strides forward in learning.

## Message from our Superintendent

Whether talking to business owners, college instructors, trade unions, vocational schools, or instructors of community colleges, the message is the same. Whether this year's high school graduates plan to go on to college or enter the workforce training programs, they will need similar academic skills.

Math and reading skills essential to readiness for success in the first year of college are comparable to those needed for success in workforce training programs. Challenging coursework is clearly important for success after high school. Students who are taking four years of English, three years of Math, and three years of Science earned much higher scores on SAT and Apprentice programs entrance tests - they are better prepared and more confident in their ability to succeed.

Our course requirements need to keep pace with the demands of college and the workforce training programs. Students need to have meaningful options when they finish high school. The skills can be taught within rigorous high school classes whether they be academic or career focused. The expectation for students who plan to attend college and those who plan to enter the workforce training programs must be the same.

The path toward after-high-school readiness begins in the elementary grades. Students won't be ready for rigorous coursework in high school if they haven't acquired the fundamental skills in elementary and middle school that lead up to those courses.

This is all to say that you will continue to see change to high school requirements and K-8 academics so that students will be better prepared for postsecondary education.
