## Reading Never Takes a Break!

Preventing summer reading loss means not taking a break from books. Here are some quick tips for summer reading with your child:

1. Read regularly $\sim$ setting aside 15 minutes each day for reading will make all the difference this fall.
2. Make a date with a librarian ~ they can help locate books based on interests

and reading ability. Take advantage of Loon Lake's Summer Reading Program.
3. As you practice reading with your child, emphasize punctuation as you read out loud together. A few examples include making your voice go down when you see a period and up when you see a question mark. Take should a short breath when you see a comma and use emphasis when you see the exclamation point. Finally, make it sound like the characters are talking.

Kids enjoy doing things they are good at. The more they read, the better they will get and the more they will want to read!

## Chewelah Peak Learning Center, K-2 Field Trip

On May 29, the K-2 classes headed for Chewelah Peak for an outdoor education field trip. Students experienced four learning stations: Ultraviolet Detectives, Nature Hike, Food Chain/Tree Parts, and Animal Tracks. All of the stations included hands-on observations and/ or participation. The students observed the effect of ultraviolet rays and discussed the importance of protection from the ultraviolet rays. They observed the plants and insects of the forest habitat, with the assistance of a nature guide. The favorite activity was Mos-
quito, Salmon, Bear, where the students took turns being the predator or the prey. All of the students were able to act out being a part of a tree, which was great fun for the teachers to watch. They also
sandcast their own animal tracks, and brought them home. The students had a great time learning and enjoying the outdoors on a picture perfect day.

On June 1, 2007, third graders at Springdale Elementary visited ancient Rome. Students dressed in tunics, stollas, and togas to act out, sing about, or report on ancient Rome. The children hated it so much that they shot and burned down many of the 45 buildings with only 4 remaining. They were returned to their homes and the boarding school was shut down. Then
it became a hospital and soon was abandoned.

The first activity we did was called "2 teach 2." One group would teach the $2^{\text {nd }}$ group something that they learned. The $2^{\text {nd }}$ group moved on and taught the $3^{\text {rd }}$ group what they learned. The next activity was hiking. The class hiked up the trail to the Pump House.

## Students Receive Scholarship Opportunities



The Mary Walker High S c h o o l graduating class has a record number of students who will continue their education in college this fall. Forty-six per cent of our graduates will attend a fouryear college. Eastern Washington, Washington State, Jamestown, Neumont, and Brigham Young are among the universities our students are enrolled in. Another
$32 \%$ are headed to two-year colleges, where they will either transfer to four-year colleges or complete technical programs.

All told almost $80 \%$ of our graduates are going to col-lege-and they are better prepared for success than ever before. Nearly all of our graduates have taken Advanced Placement classes-college level work-during their junior and senior years. More and
more of our students are pushing past minimum high school requirements and taking extra classes in advanced mathematics and sciences.

## FCCLA Attends State Leadership Conference

The Springdale, WA FCCLA chapter of the Mary Walker High School attended the 2007 Washington Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) State Leadership Conference in Wenatchee, WA, April 1113, 2007.

At the meeting the Springdale FCCLA joined with 600 students and advisers to participate in educational programs and workshops presented around the theme Amplify Your Life: Rise Above the Static! Keynote speaker, Justin Lookadoo, addressed issues of self esteem and relationships in youth lives. Justin Lookadoo is a nationally known motivational speaker. Other workshops focused on issues related to the March of Dimes and Youth Leadership.

The recognition of individual and chapter accomplishments is a big part of the state leadership conference. Students participated in STAR Events competition, speaking about projects they have developed and carried out in their homes, schools and communities. $15 \mathrm{mem}-$ bers from the Springdale FCCLA chapter participated in STAR Events as presenters.

The STAR Events closing session included a business meeting, election of National officer candidates and installation of the 2007-2008 state officers. This year Tara Keenan was elected to be the Washington State Vice President for Region 10.
