7th Graders Gear Up for College

What do you want to be when you grow up? What will you be doing in 10 years? Springdale 7th graders are wrestling with these questions. They are setting goals and making plans for the future. They have spent time looking at their strengths and interests, examining various career options, and planning for success in high school. Researching colleges and universities was the final component.

On May 14th, they got an opportunity to visit Eastern Washington University in Cheney. Visiting EWU gave them a taste of real college life. Students toured a dorm, saw the new Student Recreation Hall, complete with

an ice rink, and learned how to access information in the library. In addition they saw some classrooms, met with the admissions officer, and wrapped up with a visit to the planetarium. The student guides filled them in on all the social activities and the benefits of a university education. In the course of the day they got study tips, social tips and information on how to get into college and pay for it.

The opportunity to visit EWU is part of the Gear Up program that encourages students to plan for their future and tries to ensure that all students have access to a college education. Science Students Build Solar Ovens

Students in Mr. Moeller's eighth grade science class recently created solar ovens and used them to heat up water. After watching a report on CNN, in which a man spent less than fifty dollars to construct a solar cooker capable of cooking meals and pasteurizing water, students were inspired to create solar ovens of their own.

First, the students did some research looking at several simple designs. Pizza

box ovens, Pringle cans and other ideas were considered. Students decided on the design that each wanted to use and tested their design at home.

Thursday, May 15th was test day and several students brought their ovens to heat up some water. One student was able to heat water to over 150 degrees. All of the popular designs were made out of mostly recycled materials. Great work!

were presented by State Officers and focused on Leadership.

The WA-FCCLA Community Service Project for 2008 encouraged chapter members to collect donations and goods for Feed the Children. Recognition of individual and chapter accomplishments is a big part of the state leadership conference. Students participated in STAR events competition, speaking about projects they have developed and carried out in their homes, schools and communities. 17 from Springdale participated in STAR events as presenters, evaluators, and facilitators.

There were seven projects presented in Wenatchee. Catherine Kenney presented an illustrated talk, the Faces of Cancer, and received a silver star for her efforts. Our Parliamentary Team, consisting of Kyle Shaver, Jacob Edwards, Damien Howder, and Celest Burt took home silver stars as well. Another project called Blast Off With Reading, presented by Victoria Smartt, Nicole Breesnee, and Sara Conner, also received silver stars for their hard work. Sara Beckman, Torrie Thramer, and Haley Goad's project on skittle parties [illegal prescription drug use among teens] received a gold star.

The National FCCLA conference will be held in Orlando, FL. July 13-17, 2008. Victoria Smartt will be representing Washington as a state officer. In addition, three teams will be competing at this years national conference. Since only one entry from Washington State is chosen to attend the national conference in each category, it is a huge accomplishment for our students.

This summer in Florida, Tara Keenan and Madeline Swidergal will present their project on teen dating violence called Anti Black and Blue. Tanya Martushoff, Melodie Adams, and Ledia Marushoff's project on childhood obesity received a perfect score and a gold star, taking them to nationals. Alyssa Glass' project on Random Acts of Kindness also received a gold star, ensuring her a spot in Florida. (students attending nationals are pictured below)

News from the Superintendent

In my position as superintendent, I have the opportunity to tell people that the Mary Walker School District had a "Peak" year about 7-8 years ago and has not had a "valley" since. I realize that this may sound a bit arrogant. Still, it is true that the Mary Walker Schools have had a succession of peak years, allowing our professionals to concentrate on our students and their educational programs. As a school community, we have not suffered as other districts have the negative effects of budget battles or internal distractions that often shift attention away from student achievements. Nor have we experienced the difficulties that others have encountered when adjusting programs or defending curriculum.

While we may not be a perfect school system, I am continually impressed with the communitywide respect that we are afforded as educators. Taxpayers support us, parents encourage us, and students by and large come to school daily, ready and willing to learn. Our jobs are made easier by the absence of distractions and the respect this community holds for learning in general.
