Mary Walker Schools is placing before the voters a request to RENEW a four-year educational program maintenance and operations levy (M&O) to assist in the funding of educational programs during the 2007-2010 school years. Mail in ballots need to be postmarked by Feb-

ruary 7th in order for your vote to be counted. Please take a moment to review the facts about this important issue on pages 2 and 3 of this newsletter.

### **Replacement Levy Facts**

The local levy maintains essential educational programs and activities for students not funded by state and federal dollars.

- The proposed levy renews an expiring four-year levy approved in March 2002. It is not a new tax.
- The tax rate for 2002 was \$1.50 per \$1000 of assessed property value the tax rate for 2005 was \$1.26 per \$1000 and the replacement levy tax would be \$1.39 per \$1000.
- The owner of a \$100,000 home is currently paying approximately \$126 per year in school levy taxes. With the replacement levy the owner of a \$100,000 home would pay approximately \$139 per year in replacement levy taxes, an increase of \$13 per year.
- The replacement levy will be run for \$150,000 per year and we will receive \$384,000 from the state (maximizing our equalization from the state) per year in levy equalization funds to fund essential programs for our students.
- The amount you pay a year in school levy taxes will stay the same for four years even if the appraised value of your home increases.
- This levy will be a mail-in vote. The Stevens County Auditor will mail the ballot to voters on January 18, 2006. To be counted, your ballot must be postmarked by February 7, 2006.

#### What is a levy?

An educational program maintenance and operations replacement levy (as it is referred to on the ballot) is a local property tax that supports educational programs for students.

Because the state does not fully fund education for students, school districts across the state run levies to pay for things the state does not. Maintenance and operation replacement levies provide for student educational programs, which include all, or portions, of existing programs such as special education, learning enhancement textbooks, music, art, drama, extra curricular activities, classroom support, maintenance, some student transportation, fieldtrips, classroom reduction, and safety and security, etc. **Levies are extremely critical in order to provide a complete educational program for our children.** 

#### STATE MATCH FOR THE MARY WALKER SCHOOL DISTRICT

Passage of the levy will provide Mary Walker School District an additional \$384,000 in state equalization funding in each of the four years. In the past we have run the levy for \$135,000 per year and the equalization money from the state has been \$360,000. This levy will provide the opportunity for the District to maximize/increase (by \$24,000 per year) the money we can receive from the state. Without the levy, the district will not be eligible to receive these funds. Levy equalization or matching funds are to assist communities that otherwise would have to pay excessive tax rates compared to other communities. The matching funds are an incentive for districts to pass levies.



### **News from the Nurse**

School faculty and staff at Mary Walker School are concerned about the health and safety of the children, their families and the community. One of the most frequently asked question by parents is, "When should I keep my child home from school?" Ask yourself, "Will he/ she be able to participate in regular classroom activities and does he/she have anything that might be contagious?" In general, you should keep your child home for the following reasons:



- Temperature of 100 degrees or more in the last 24 hours
- Vomiting and/or persistent diarrhea during the night or in the morning
- Severe sore throat, especially a red throat or white patches on the tonsils
- Red, draining eyes
- Uncontrolled/Untreated lice, impetigo, scabies or ringworm
- Chickenpox (until all lesions have crusted over)
- First 24-48 hours of antibiotic treatment

If a child becomes ill at school, the parent/guardian is contacted. The student can be released <u>only</u> to the parent/guardian or to the person designated on the school's emergency card.

<u>Reye's Syndrome.</u> This is a very serious disease that can develop 3-5 days after the onset of a viral illness. Studies have shown that using aspirin or aspirin-containing medications to treat viral illnesses increases the chances of developing Reye's Syndrome. Aspirin is part of the salicylate family of medicines. Another name for aspirin used on labels is acetylsalicylate, acetylsalicylic acid, salicylates or salicylic acid. Reye's Syndrome targets the liver and brain. It is noncontagious and often misdiagnosed as encephalitis, meningitis, diabetes or poisoning. Relentless or continuous vomiting is the most obvious symptom of the disease. It can be diagnosed or ruled out with the results of two liver function tests (SGOT/SGPT) at the hospital.

<u>Lice.</u> Tis the season to be loused? It's not a laughing matter. Every Tuesday we will be conducting lice head checks. **Please have clean hair**!

Immunization Compliance. Thank you to all the parents who took the time to update their child's vaccines and/or school records. After July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2006 Varicella (Chicken Pox) immunization or proof of having had the disease, will be a requirement before entering school for the school year 2006/2007. Please sign and return the forms.

Tamara Menz is doing a project called "Adopt a Soldier". Her project involves volunteers writing to soldiers overseas to give them encouragement and support. It is her hope to have all the letters sent by the end of January. Tyka Keenan and Trevor Ferguson are preparing a project on drinking and driving. As part of their presentation, they will be using vision impairment goggles to emphasis what it is like to be under the influence.

This was then followed by an assembly to show what it was like after a drinking and driving accident.

#### **Mid-School Wrestlers Have Great Season**

While the Mid-School Wrestling Program was small, the talent was not. According to coach Tony Hamilton, "All three wrestlers will someday be state placers. Cody Pardun, CJ Kenney, and Conan Kalugin showed great improvement over the season." Such improvement that they were able to represent Springdale Schools at the season-ending tournament in grand fashion.

Cody and CJ each placed third while Conan found himself atop the 1st place podium. Cody wrestled very well all season despite not having much prior experience. His improvement showed as he out hustled his opponents on the mat. CJ and Conan began as experienced wrestlers. This led them face to face with opponents they have wrestled in the past which caused some problems early on in the season. As the season progressed, they were able to overcome their opponents and wrestle them with more confidence.

The season began with long lonely practice sessions. We practiced as a small squad for the first two weeks while we accumulated the required 12 practices before the first match. The first match was cancelled by the coach after not having enough wrestlers eligible to wrestle. Following in the High School wrestling program's successful steps as five time Academic State Champions, grades were highly esteemed. "I felt that it was not a benefit to anyone to take wrestlers who were not passing in all classes. I also weighed the dollar and cents issue of traveling to Colville with only one eligible wrestler. I decided that it would be more beneficial for everyone to remain home and study," says Coach Hamilton.

After the first three weeks of practice, the mid-school wrestlers were joined by the high school program. While they never wrestled with them, the midschoolers received the same training and conditioning required of the high school athletes. This was a tremendous benefit to everyone. These practices benefited the mid-school program immensely. It prepared them for what to expect next year as they prepare themselves to be State Champions.
