### Mary Walker Receives Foundational AVID Grant

The Mary Walker School District and the P.R.E.P Consortium (Panorama League Schools) are recipients of a six -year Foundational AVID grant worth about 1.2 million over the six years. Each of the seven schools involved in this grant will receive over \$28,000 per year to be used for teacher and administrator professional development and AVID curriculum.

This 7<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade grant provides an opportunity for the consortium schools to develop and establish a program that has been highly successful in creating a college/postsecondary-going culture that includes teachers and all grade levels and disciplines. This program will play a critical role in readying all students for the rigorous academic programs needed for college/postsecondary success. We see AVID as an organizing principle that compliments, connects, coordinates, and improves all elements of our post -secondary readiness efforts.

The AVID program was built

to help prepare students for post-secondary education that meet one or more of the following criteria:

- First to attend college/ post secondary education in their family
- Historically underserved students in four year colleges and post secondary education
- Low income students
- Special circumstances

We believe that AVID provides and delivers the effective support so that all students can meet state and college/ postsecondary standards.

The Mary Walker School District and the P.R.E.P. consortium are truly excited to receive this consortium grant and to be the first small school consortium in the country to implement the AVID program. Historically, AVID has been implemented in large schools and large districts. The P.R.E.P. Consortium will be the National Pilot for small schools for the AVID program.

### 7th Graders Deepen Comprehension

The 7<sup>th</sup> graders are currently working on reading strategies to deepen comprehension. We all talk about comprehension and understanding what was read, but how does it work? How do we go beyond the literal or right there on the page meaning? One way to get deeper is to transform the text from one form to another.

The students are reading the

poem "Casey at the Bat" and really analyzing all the vocabulary and what the story is about. They are making a picture in their head, visualizing stanza by stanza. Then they are transforming it into a new form; a sports page news article. The title or headline gives the main point of the poem, the article reports the play by play and crowd involvement, and the illustration

gives another look at the focus of the action. By going through these steps, students understand all the nuances of the poem and what the author was thinking.

This is just the first of many text transformations the 7<sup>th</sup> graders will perform this year in search of deeper meanings.

### Snow Make-up Days Announced

Our District was closed for four days due to winter weather and hazardous road conditions. The dates that school was cancelled so far were December 18 and 19, 2008, and January 6 and 7, 2009.

The State requires 180 days of school attendance per

year. The Mary Walker School District No. 207 has one snow day built into the 2008-2009 school year calendar, Monday, June 8, 2009. The second through fourth cancelled days will be made up on Tuesday through Thursday, June 9-11, 2009. This would make the last day of school June

11th. If we have more school closures, the additional make-up days could be added to the end of the school year.

### 8th Grade Students Explore Writing Styles

Students in eighth grade Language Arts are comparing challenges in society now to challenges in the past by examining information found in the news, movie clips, short texts, poems, and

the novel, <u>The</u> <u>Giver</u>. They are becoming critics to better understand how a director and an author use techniques of their

trade to "sell" their points of view.

Students will incorporate what they have learned by creating their own travel brochures and posters for

their idea of a perfect society or u t o p i a . Their goals are to try to "sell" their u t o p i a n community to tourists through their projects.

Students will also experiment with developing their own style of writing through word choice, punctuation, and sentence building. Using the sentences of published authors as a model, students then integrate the new style of sentence or punctuation in their own writing.

### Middle School Science News

As the new semester begins, seventh grade students are brushing off their calculators and sharpening their pencils. We have begun the study of motion.

Many of the skills that are taught in Math are now put to good use in Science. Graphing motion helps us to visualize how an object moves and understand the relationships between force, mass and motion. When students take the time to understand the concepts, they will help build the foundation necessary to be successful in High School.

The Earth, Moon, and Sun are the topics studied in the Eighth classgrade Students room. presented posters or PowerPoints plaining the difference between solar and lunar eclipses or what a penumbra

The reason that we have seasons is also a hot topic for science. Many think that we are closer to the Sun in the summer and farther in the winter. The reality is closest to the Sun in early J a n u a r y. Why, then is it so cold? The seasons are determined by the amount of daylight we receive and the intensity of the Sun's rays. Due to the tilt of the Earth, we have very short days and indirect sunlight dur-

### Superintendent Addresses State Deficit

The Washington State Constitution states, "It is the paramount duty of the State to make ample provision for the education of all children residing in its borders." My understanding is that Washington State is the only state which defines public education as the state's paramount duty.

A decade ago, Washington State was among the top ten states in regard to per-student funding. We are now in the bottom ten (position #42). Given the current economy, I would not be surprised to see us fall further behind. The Washington state newspapers report a \$7 billion budget

deficit for this biennium. While I believe that cuts to public education are inevitable, the question of how deep and to which programs remains unknown. Other state agencies have been asked to assume a potential reduction of twenty percent (20%) to the biennial budget requests. K-12 public education will not be unaffected by these reductions.

The Mary Walker School District continues to operate under a conservative district budget utilizing grants and federal dollars on a continuing basis whenever possible. Our district will continue to search for opportunities to

maintain high standards and improve on the programs already established.

We cannot forecast what the pending deficit will mean to our District. We do know as a District, that we value the quality educational programs that our students and families have come to expect and certainly deserve. We will continue to monitor the State budget deficit to see how the shortage will affect us.
