Sign your child up for a summer adventure! Students who are currently enrolled in grades K-3 may sign up. You do not have to be enrolled in the Mary Walker School District to attend summer school. This is a FREE opportunity for ALL learners!

Dates for summer school are June 21st-July 1st and August 16th-26th (Monday thru Thursday). Parents have the option to sign up for both sessions or just one. Classes are from 8:30-12:30 with breakfast and lunch provided.

## MSP Testing

Over the past week, students in grades 3-8 have been putting their skills to the test on the Washington Assessment, now known as the MSP (Measurement of Student Progress). Students are tested on the CORE subjects: Reading, Writing, Mathematics and Science. All of the students have been putting forth $100 \%$ each and every day. Thank you to all the parents who made sure appointments and vacations were taken after state testing. Your child's test scores will be released in the fall of 2010 .

## Preschool and Kindergarten Registration is Now Open!

If you have a child who is between the ages 3 to 5 , we have open registration for our SchoolBased Preschool. If your child is of age 3 they will be signed up for a 2 day-a-week program (Wednesday and Friday), from 8:00-11:15. Transportation is provided to all students within our bussing route. If your child is age 4 or 5 , they will be signed up for a 4 day-a-week program (Tuesday thru Friday), from 8:00-11:15. Transportation will also be provided for these students who live along the bussing route.

The Preschool teachers focus on basic skills needed for kindergarten readiness: social skills,
letter sounds and identification, basic math skills, arts/crafts and so much more! The first day of Preschool will be September $7^{\text {th }}$ for ages $4-5$ and September $8^{\text {th }}$ for age 3.

If your child turns 5 by August $31^{\text {st }}$, they are eligible for Kindergarten! Students who enroll in our Kindergarten class will attend school five days a week. Academics will focus on reading, writing, science, mathematics and social studies. Social skills will also be included within the classroom day. A current immunization is needed, along with a birth certificate for enrollment. The first day of school will be September $1^{\text {st }}$.

You may register your child for both Preschool and Kindergarten over the summer months. The elementary office will be closing on June $18^{\text {th }}$; however the district office will have registration forms available for anyone who wishes to enroll after school is out. The elementary office will re-open on August $18^{\text {th }}$ with hours 8:00-3:00.

## $8^{\text {th }}$ Grade Promotion

Mark your calendars for June $8^{\text {th }}!$ On that day our current $8^{\text {th }}$ graders will be promoted to High School. Promotion will be held in the high school gymnasium due to the high number of students being promoted. Students will be required to be at the school no later than 6:30 p.m. for pictures and last minute preparations (remember appropriate attire: ladies - no strapless dress, gentlemen - slacks and a dress shirt). Promotion will start at 7 pm followed by a light dessert afterward. Congratulations $8^{\text {th }}$ grade class of 2014!

# Updated Ethnicity and Race Category Reporting 

Each year, school districts in Washington are required to report student data by ethnicity and race categories to the state's Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI). Ethnicity and race categories used in our district are the same as are used in all Washington school districts. They are set by the federal government, the Washington State Legislature, and OSPI.

OSPI is required to report the total number of students in various categories in each school to the federal government, but it does not report individual student data. These reports help our district and the state keep track of changes in student enrollment and various outcomes (such as graduation rates) to ensure that all students receive the educational programs and
services to which they are entitled.

Recently, the federal government and OSPI changed the reporting categories for student ethnic and race data. As a result of the new reporting categories, we need to ask you to identify your child as either Hispanic/Latino or not Hispanic/Latino and by one or more racial groups. Washington has 57 racial categories to choose from.

If your family is Asian, you will now be able to list your child as either Chinese, Japanese, or belonging to one or more of the other Asian groups. If your family is Native American, you will be able to list your child's tribal affiliation. If one parent identifies with one race and the other parent with another,
you will be able to check both races for your child.

Starting in September 2010, all public schools in Washington will need to start using these new categories (for a sample of new form, please see next page). For more information about the student data reporting categories, please see:

The Washington State Department of Health has created a new immunization schedule for preschool and kindergarten age students. These new requirements go into effect beginning July 1st and so will pertain to students enrolled or enrolling in school for the 2010-2011 year.

Long Jump, 100, 400 as well as strong placings in high jump, Discus, 100 Hurdles, 200, 800, and Mile events. Coach Dave Howard says the boys were dedicated and worked very hard and as the season went on they improved at every meet they competed in.


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The mission of AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) is to ensure that all students, and most especially students in the middle capable of completing a college preparatory path:

- Will succeed in the most rigorous curriculum.
- Will enter mainstream activities of the school.
- Will increase their enrollment in four-year colleges.
- Will become educated and responsible participants and leaders in a democratic society.

AVID recognizes that the only way students can get into and through college is by perseverance, hard work, and, as the program name reveals, "individual determination." AVID students do not receive any special breaks. But, AVID provides what first generation college students usually lack: high expectations, encouragement, academic support, a vision that college is attainable, and guidance in ways to negotiate the system. AVID involves students in strong groups of peers and adults who share a commitment to academic achievement and who work together to help the group succeed.

AVID is designed to achieve specific objectives:

- To support students in rigorous college preparatory programs and to enroll students in honors and advanced placement classes.
- To develop the habits and skills students need to succeed.
- To develop good study habits and academic survival skills, such as, note taking, essay writing, and time management.
- To support students in maintaining grade point averages that will be competitive in applying to four-year colleges and universities.
- To foster positive attitudes toward school and higher education.
- To help students become knowledgeable about colleges, develop a plan to get in college, and apply to appropriate colleges and for financial aid.
- To enroll $100 \%$ of AVID graduates in colleges and universities including $80 \%$ in four-year institutions


## The criteria for AVID are:

## Ability

- Academic potential to succeed in college preparatory courses and in college with tutorial support, typically a GPA of $2.3-3.5$ (C+ $\mathrm{B}+$ ) average is required in middle school classes.


## Desire and Determination

- A desire to attend college.
- A willingness to undertake demanding preparation for college.


## Special consideration

- Traditionally under represented students in college
- Those in low socioeconomic households (as determined by eligibility for free or reduced price lunch).
- First generation in their family to attend college
- Students who are historically unlikely to attend college
- Students who face some challenge or possible block to attending college.

NOTE: A student does not have to meet all of the criteria, a student may have other circumstances that merit participation in the program.
