# School of Distinction Awarded to Springdale Elementary

Springdale Elementary School was recently awarded "School of Distinction" by the State of Washington. The Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) awarded 98 schools for their outstanding academic growth. This award reflects the real gains schools have made that aren't recognized by the federal "No Child Left Behind" law or calculation of "Adequate Yearly Progress" (also known as AYP). To be considered for this award, each school had to exceed the state average performance in the 4<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup> or 10<sup>th</sup> grade in the areas of reading and math, as measured by the spring 2008 Washington Assessment of Student Learning (WASL).

Schools that met the average performance requirements were then evaluated for WASL performance during the past six years. The top 5% of elementary, middle, and high schools were given the distinction award. This year there were only 53 elementary schools that received the award. Springdale Elementary was the only rural elementary school to receive the award of distinction. The other two elementary schools in Eastern Washington were from the Spokane Area.

This award is a great honor to our staff, students and community. Each and every person in the building has contributed to the great successes our students have seen over the past six years. Everyone needs to be proud of this accomplishment and celebrate the fact that our kids can surpass the expectation when we all work together!

Staff and students received a beautiful glass plague that is in the main entryway to the elementary/middle school, as well as a banner that will be hung to remind everyone of the accomplishments that our students have achieved. Please stop by to see the award and congratulate teachers and students on a job well done!

#### **Parent - Teacher Conferences**

#### Emergency Contact Information

If you move to a new location, or need to change who can pick up your child, please contact the office ASAP. We need to make sure that all emergency and pick-up information is current at all times. Unless you notify the office of the changes, the office will use the information that

you provided upon registering your child. This information is very helpful in the event of an evacuation, emergency or even if your child is sick. We appreciate your

### **Preparing for School Closures**

Mary Walker School District's School Closure Procedure is in place to ensure the safety of students and staff in the event of an unexpected school closure. The plan includes several elements that it is important for parents to be aware of.

First, an emergency plan for all students must be on file in the event that it is necessary to close school early. We would like to know where your child should go in case of an emergency or unexpected school closing. Cause of an emergency school closure may include an extended electrical outage, gas line leak, interruption of water or sewer service, or severe weather conditions.

Checking the safety of the students' route to school is especially important in winter because weather in Northeast Washington can be quite challenging! Parents need to know that they have a choice if they decide the weather, roads, bus stop, or walking conditions are unsafe for their students with consideration for the students' maturity level and clothing.

The expectation in the Mary Walker School District is to hold school every day that we can safely transport students and that our staff can safely get to work. However, parents are in the best position to make a judgment as to *(Continued on page 4)*

### **CTE Class Receives National Accreditation**

The EETC (Engine Equipment Training Council) has awarded Mary Walker High School's Power Equipment Technology (Small Engines) class with national certification for the teaching of 4stroke and 2-stroke engine service and repair.

Teacher David Howard applied for EETC certification in November of 2007 through a written application process and in June of 2008 a national certification representative came to the school to look over the program. The curriculum, tools and facility were all inspected and met EETC

standards. Mary Walker High School is one of only four schools in the state to receive certification.

When students take and



pass the EETC certification test they receive nationally recognized certification. The power equipment industry has а shortage of qualified techs. Jobs in

this industry should continue to grow as all homeowners have one or more types of power equipment products.

### FFA Chapter Qualifies for State

The beginning of this new school year has been extremely productive for our chapter. The first competition was Stevens County Land Judging near Addy and our chapter had nearly thirty members come to participate. Our scores were not great but it was the first competition and we stayed positive and tried to improve.

The second competition was at Colfax and about twenty members went to compete. Our team made some big improvements and the scores reflect their hard work. The most recent was at Lind-Ritzville where our chapter qualified for state. We placed 15th out of 50 teams and will be going to Garfield-Palouse on November 4th to compete to go to Nationals.

## News from the Superintendent

#### Keeping Our Schools Safe

Across the United States schools are constantly looking at trends that bring about inappropriate behavior or safety concerns for students. While larger schools may be experiencing an increase in discipline issues and safety concerns, the Mary Walker School District is being proactive in keeping all students safe while on campus. Students, staff and administrators continue to work on developing positive relationships with each other.

Administrators work closely with teachers to get their input on trend behaviors that are seen on a constant basis. By tracking these behaviors the administration has been able to effectively set behavior expectations by dealing with inappropriate behaviors in a positive/proactive way. Over the last few years, discipline issues involving student confrontations, safety concerns and student suspensions have decreased.

Our first step as a district was to ensure that all students were aware of behavior expectations. In order to effectively do this, administration worked closely with teachers to establish behavior guidelines that all students must follow, along with consequences when these expectations were not met. These expectations allow students to see exactly what is expected of them throughout their day. It also allows administration to be consistent when dealing with inappropriate behavior.

Another step in looking at safety measures and improving discipline district wide was to add more cameras around the school grounds. Live video is filmed 24/7 and provides a (Continued on page 5)
